## PANHANDLE BACK COUNTRY HORSEMEN GENERAL MEETING **AUGUST 19, 2010 MINUTES**

President Bob Williams called the meeting to order at 7:45pm.

No guests or new members present.

July Minutes were read and are now part of the record.

ENGLISH POINT TRAIL CLEARING- Tom Knoll reported that he along with Les and Claire Erickson went out at 6:15. They made the long loop and cleared one log. The tree on the bridge was already done. Tom thought the Boy Scouts did a clean up in the spring. He also noted that if you take all the loops you can get in about a ten mile ride.

RED IVES WORK PROJECT - Bob Williams reported that there were 19 riders. The Kimball's group went on the Line Creek, the Shriner's group went on Simmons and Indian Creek, cutting out one log. The Parson's group was on Beaver and Upper Fly. The Funke's did Mosquito and Upper Fly. There are two drainage ditches up at the top where Beaver and Upper fly meet that need to have work done on them. This is the spot where Jill and Bob got dumped last year, when their horses leapt over the water. Gary Edwards is to going to talk with the FS about these ditches to see what we can do.

SELKIRK JOINT RIDE - Karen Kimball is the Trail Boss and the date had been set for the 28th. Location and directions have not been finalized and an e-mail will be sent out when we have that information.

STEAK RIDE – April Linscott sent an e-mailing stating that the ride will be on Sept 25th at Liberty Lake, WA. There is no parking fee. Riders will start out at 10:00 AM. This is a  $2\frac{1}{2}$  - 3 hour ride. There is water along the trail, but none at trail head. Cost is \$10 per person, must be pre-paid by Sept 20th, non refundable. Her directions will be in the newsletter. Lea Williams said another way to get there was to exit at Stateline and head to Petebuilt.

Bob Williams reported that the BoD talked about updating our Chapter Display for the Nov Convention. If anyone would like to take that on let him know. Someone will be talking to Joe Swindig and Shackleford about helping with the trail researches. BCHI has a 501(c)4 nonprofit status and we have a 501(c)3 that we got before the state organization was formed. Karen Kimball is going to check into those. We need to get a change of address to the State Secretary. BCHA was looking into raffling off a truck, but that is not going to happen. Colorado has a special plate "Support the Horse" which has generate money for their trails and maybe ID should check into it. Also received an e-mail from BCHA regarding a partnership with the Wilderness Society and the verbiage on horse use that they will support. Copy will be in the newsletter.

CHRISTMAS PARTY – Angela Parson will chair the event again. Linda Funke, Diane Shriner and Debbie Samovar will help.

PROGRAMS – Bob Williams will talk to Terry Sverdsten about getting programs lined up for the winter meetings. Bob is working on getting DVD on "Defensive Horsemanship -How to use your horse to protect your self".

13 members were present.

Andrea Clark's name was drawn for the \$171 Progressive Pot, which will now carry over to September.



## **Marie Creek Weed Spraying**


On July 22nd we did part of our spraying on Marie Cr. Jim and I went up 202 to where the trail takes off on the North ridge. Jim help get the sprayers ready and Bonnie from the Forest Service meet us and mixed the spray. Jerry Shriner came up with a pack horse to carry extra spray and water and help with the boxes. Jim had to work so didn't go on the ride. I lead the horse with the spray containers and Bonnie did the spraying. Got the ridge done with some adjusting to the tanks.

Then on Aug 16th, Jim and I went up 202 again to finish the spraying. This time we started where the trail crosses the road. Jim carried the backpack sprayer. We don't think that part of the trail going down the switchback and the up the other end before you hit the trailhead was wide enough for the sprayer boxes on the packhorse. Jim walked part of the time spraying and then part of the time he was on Boggie and sprayed. I lead the horses, one with extra spray mixed and water if needed. Got it all done. Jim even sprayed some of the meadow.







Speaking for the Panhandle Nordic Ski & Snowshoe Club, I believe our Board would welcome any additional summer use at the Fourth of July Area. I will conduct a straw vote of the Board, but it has been our position that any non-motorized use of the area during the summer months broadens public support for the generally non-motorized use of the Forest south of I-90. We can always use help with trail and facility maintenance, but such help gives other users a vested interest in the area and the protective viewpoint that comes with it. The only concern I would have is early notification of the horse riding community that also makes more and more use of the area during the summer months. Large groups of horses and mountain bikes are not going to mix well unless both sides review their trail manners concerning horse- mountain bike encounters.

Only Andy can speak for the USFS on this use.

As for Park-N-Ski sales that is up to her and IDPR, however, I can stop in and talk with her about the club's group of vendors, who sell for us and plow the extra dollar back into the club which in turn plows it back into the area or as a business they might need an the additional dollar to make ends meet, especially in these tough times. In any case we would want them to have our area designation marked to assure the flow of funds back to Fourth of July and its improvement.

User conflict between horse and bike is the first thing that comes to my mind. Several years back (maybe 10) we encouraged summer time family friendly bike use at 4th of July Ski trail system but it never really took off. Recently the Back Country Horsemen have begun to use the area and have installed horse friendly gates and hitching posts. For the most part the trails are old roads with 14' or more of road prism and grades less than 10%. Plenty of room for the quiet family friendly bike rider to pass a line of horseback riders. We would not have the black diamond mountain biker quietly tearing down a 15% 18 inch tread width, which is where much of the conflict arises. I think it might be okay, but maybe the groups should talk. I can help facilitate that discussion. Special Uses are handled by Claire Pitner here at Fernan. She can be reached at 769-3033.

Hi Andy, Geoff and Leo,

I am Carrie's dad, Kent Eggleston and I work for the same store that Andy works for..just in a different department. In fact my department in the Forest Service (Coeur d'Alene Nursery) provided some of the seedlings that were planted at the 4th of July clear cuts about 10 or 15 years ago. Some of those trees are still there...some aren't.

Anyway-Carrie wanted me to follow-up with each of your responses to her request to sell the vehicle passes this winter and the possibility in using the 4th of July to hold an event. Carrie was very impressed with how quick she received responses and hopes that she and the store can work together with the Panhandle Nordic Club and the Idaho Parks and Recreation and the Forest Service in making 4th of July a more popular stopping spot. I personally use the ski trails as soon as they are packed and ski able. I also road the trails today on my mountain bike and was able to ride 12 miles without re-tracing a trail and still not getting to try all of them. There is guite a network there to work with.

Leo-Thank you for your quick and positive response to Carrie on the store being able to sell the vehicle passes. She would like to have trails pictures and maps in the store to help inform our local community of the 4th of July trail system.

Geoff-Thank you for the visit to the store and meeting with you. I plan to signup with the Nordic Club to assist in trail maintenance and grooming. I'm sure our mountain bike riders will join me in helping your club as well once they see the potential we have to work together.

Andy-Let me know when we can meet with the horse groups that use the trail system. I noticed their blue/green gates while riding and I think we can work some arrangement that will be equitable for all.

Our thoughts on an event for next year are just getting started. One idea included a May or July 2011 run and Mt bike event where the participant will run and bike throughout the trail system to complete a 5km run and a 15 to 20km Mt ride. The combination event allows for foot traffic to be done on areas where bikes might be to harsh on the trails or too steep and this area does not have a true "mountain event" and we're surrounded by them. But many details would have to be worked out over the winter to finalize. I think with some local marketing and event hosting the trails have the potential to be one of the most used with easy access, gentle slopes, and available structure facilities. But we need to discuss everyone's needs and ideas for this area and see how they will all work together.

Carrie wants me to be available for any discussion that needs to be done and I can be reached at 208-659-3948.

Thank you again everyone for a very positive reply to e-mails. I look forward to future meetings and working on the 4th of July trail system.

Dear Back Country Horsemen and Horsewomen;

We are pleased to announce a significant accomplishment from our 'Wild Riders' partnership with The Wilderness Society.

As many of you know, the BCHA Wilderness Committee, in its initial meeting in 1999, proposed that members work with their legislators to have wording inserted in new wilderness bills that would preserve our historical access. The wording approved by the Board of Directors was: "Traditional recreational saddle and pack stock use is recognized as an appropriate and historical use of wilderness."

As the result of wilderness planning efforts that we've been involved in since that time, BCHA is of the opinion that the original wording is insufficient to address the inappropriately restrictive practices being recommended by some of the more extremist advocacy groups and individuals. These extreme groups have not proposed that horses be totally eliminated; however, their efforts to reduce the development scale on a significant portion of the trail system would seriously limit the amount of wilderness that is actually available for pack and saddle stock use. As such, we have discussed amending the wording to include "maintenance of a trail system and associated trailhead structures to a sufficient standard to accommodate historical saddle and pack stock."

Last spring we asked our Wilderness Society "Wild Riders" to jointly sponsor wording of that nature, and after extensive deliberation they have responded with language that they would not oppose. The following language is a huge improvement over what BCHA originally proposed and language that appeared in the 2009 Omnibus Bill:

HORSEBACK RIDING.—Nothing in this subtitle precludes horseback riding in, or the entry of recreational or commercial saddle or pack stock into, an area designated as wilderness by this subtitle—

- (1) in accordance with the Wilderness Act and
- (2) in accordance with House Report 95-540 of P.L. 95-237, 1978 and using the minimum tool necessary to enhance wilderness character where appropriate and/or necessary
  - (3) subject to any terms and conditions determined to be necessary by the Secretary.

While this language does not specifically mention trail maintenance, it addresses our concern by reference to House Report 95-540. HR 95-540 admonishes the Forest Service for their "purity criteria" and provides specific instruction on how the 1964 Wilderness Act is to be interpreted as it relates to certain uses and activities that are important to many of our members – including hunting, fishing, fish stocking, historic cabins as well as trails, bridges and signs. In the report, Congress specifically stated **that trails, trail signs and bridges "... are often important to the recreational access and use of a wilderness area. Trail construction or maintenance can include the use of mechanical equipment where appropriate and/or necessary."** This renewed focus on Congress's intent, as defined by the Endangered American Wilderness Act directives, is a particularly important achievement.

The Wilderness Society has stated their preference to help BCHA address overly restrictive practices through intervention in administrative processes and policies rather than through statutory or committee report language. In recent communications they have re-stated their commitment to working with BCHA on the administrative policies and practices front. However, they agreed to review proposals we send their way. They have honored that commitment through a lengthy and thoughtful deliberation, now it is our responsibility to use this tool when and where it is appropriate to do so.

The 1964 Wilderness Act did not identify uses that would be considered appropriate, only those that were prohibited or allowed by exception. Pack and saddle stock were a dominant and accepted presence in the original wildernesses and an integral part of the wilderness movement. In a speech commemorating Aldo Leopold's contribution to the concept and establishment of wilderness areas in the United States, Harvey Broome, President of the Wilderness Society, quoted an article that Leopold wrote in 1921 in the Journal of Forestry in which Leopold identified wilderness as "a space which would absorb a two weeks' pack trip. The man who wants wilderness" he said, "wants not only scenery and hunting and fishing and isolation, but riding, daily movement, and the variety found only in a trip through a big stretch of back country."

Values and attitudes have changed since 1964. Eighty percent of our population currently lives in an urban environment. Horses are not part of the image that they have of 'wilderness.' The suggested wording for new wilderness bills is simply a reminder that the "pack train," and opportunities for primitive travel and subsistence, are "touchstone[s]" to our past and the very genesis of the wilderness movement.

We are aware that some chapters and states have not currently seen the need for such language to re-establish our cultural and symbolic heritage. It is their choice, of course, whether or not they wish to pursue language in new bills – although we see little harm in doing so, and potential value of having the language in the future. We are also aware that some chapters and states will not support "one more acre of wilderness" without some assurance that pack and saddle stock will continue to be recognized as an appropriate use. Hopefully this wording will provide that assurance.

We are also aware that some states and chapters with very little wilderness feel that we are spending an inordinate amount of time on wilderness language. However, when we recognize wilderness as the most restrictive land classification on our public lands, acceptance of pack and saddle stock as an appropriate use in wilderness would make it increasingly difficult to make the case that it is not acceptable in a less restrictive classification.

Where the proposed wording is supported by local BCH chapters/units, we suggest that members get involved in 'campaigns' as soon as they become aware of new wilderness proposals by contacting their legislators and the grass roots organizations that are proposing the legislation, and ask that the language be included.
