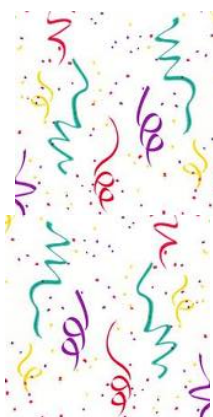

Please read back of application and sign as indicated.

1. Definitions. Herein “PBCH” means Panhandle Back Country Horsemen, its officers, agents, activity coordinators, activity leaders; “BCHI” means Back Country Horsemen of Idaho and the Back Country Horsemen of Idaho Foundation, its chapters, officers, directors and members. “I” means the undersigned individual, all heirs, and the members of their family, including any minors whether or not accompanying the individual, and the personal representative, executors, and administrators of the individual.

3. Legal Action Limitation. If any of the entities listed above has to take legal action in relation to this Agreement, and the entity is successful in the action, the unsuccessful party shall pay to the entity, in addition to all sums that the unsuccessful party may be called on to pay, a reasonable sum for the entity's attorney's fees and court costs. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Idaho. Venue for any dispute or litigation arising out of this Agreement shall be in Kootenai County State District Court. 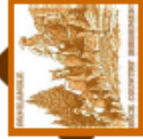

Calling All Camp Cooks

Dutch Oven Cherry Clafouti

Total Time: 40 min Pre: 10 min Cook: 30 min Yield: 8 servings

Ingredients

- 12 ounces fresh or frozen cherries
- 2 large eggs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup whole milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- Butter, for the Dutch oven



Directions: Preheat an oven to 400 degrees F or prepare charcoal for cooking outdoors by heating coals in a chimney starter until hot and ashy. Butter the bottom and sides of a 5-quart Dutch oven. If using fresh cherries, rinse, stem and pit the cherries. If using frozen, place the cherries into a colander and allow to thaw completely before using. Discard the juice. Spread the cherries evenly over the bottom of the Dutch oven. In a mixing bowl, whisk together the eggs and sugar until frothy and lightened in color. Add the milk, vanilla and flour and whisk to combine. Pour the batter over the cherries.

Oven baking: Bake on the middle rack, uncovered, for 30 minutes or until golden on top and a knife comes out clean when inserted into the middle.

Outdoor coals: Place 18 to 19 coals on a Dutch oven table. Place a cooling rack, or other wire rack, that is at least 2-inches high, directly over the coals. Place the Dutch oven on the rack directly over the coals. Cover with the lid and place 22 to 23 coals on top. Cook with the lid on for 25 minutes. Remove the lid and cook for another 5 minutes or until golden on top and a knife comes out clean when inserted into the middle.

Allow to cool for 30 minutes before removing from the Dutch oven, slicing and serving.

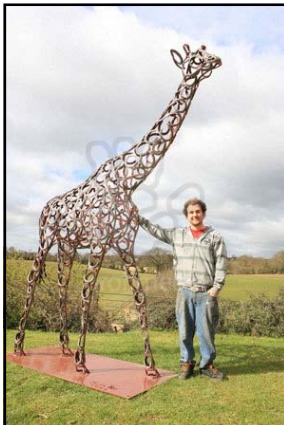

Do Not Withhold Forage from Your Horse Before Exercise

A tip from Dr. Juliet M. Getty, PhD, *Rocky Mountain Rider Magazine, November 2011 issue*

Truth or myth? The horse's stomach should be empty while exercising to avoid digestive upset.

Myth. Mostly.

We don't feel comfortable exercising after a large meal and we therefore assume that our horses don't either.

But define a "meal." We generally think of a meal as feeding a commercially fortified feed—something that comes out of a bag.

Or we may feed a meal of oats along with supplements. And in this instance, the myth is actually truth. This type of meal—low in fiber and high in feedstuffs that provide starch, protein, and fat—should *not* be fed immediately before exercising your horse. *But forage should!* It's just the opposite: Restrict forage before exercise and *you'll produce, rather than avoid, digestive upset.* Here's why...

The horse's stomach, unlike our own, secretes acid all the time. That's right—it never stops. Chewing produces saliva, a natural antacid. But left without anything to chew, the acid will accumulate in the stomach and settle along the bottom (as water would in an empty jar).

The lower portion of the stomach (the glandular region) has a protective mucus layer, but the upper squamous region has no such lining. Ask your horse to move, and the acid sloshes around, reaching the unprotected area, leading to an ulcer.

And, as the acid flows through the small intestine, cecum, and large colon, it can cause further damage along its wake, potentially leading to colic and ulcerative colitis.

Allow your horse to graze on hay or pasture before asking him to move; 15 minutes ought to do the trick. You'll keep him healthy and save him from physical and mental discomfort, which will all add up to his being more relaxed and receptive.

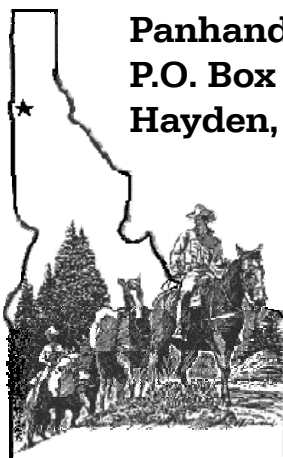
